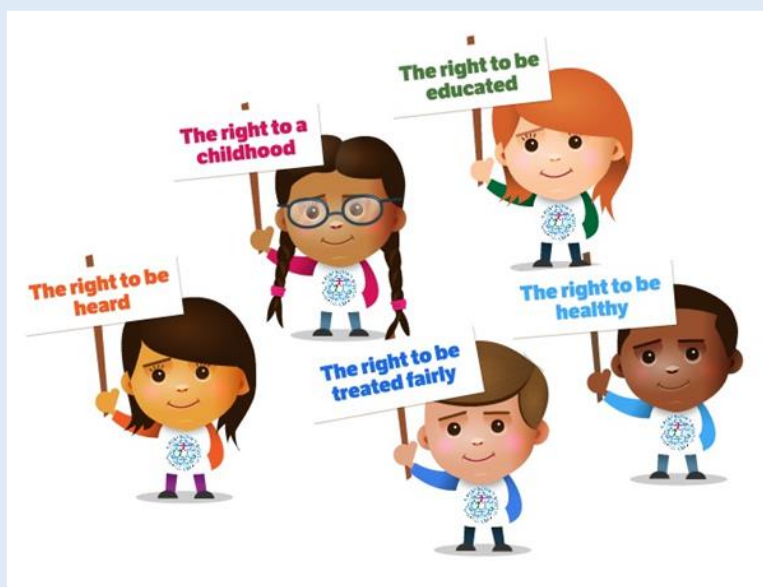

At Guston Church of England Primary School safeguarding means that all staff respect you as children. We think your good health, safety, welfare and learning are a right and we will teach you how to recognise risks, protect yourself and stay safe.

How do we protect you?

- We give you a safe school environment to play and learn in
- We will protect you from harm in school and at home
- We will protect your physical and mental health so you can grow, thrive, be happy and be the best you can be
- We will teach you how to recognise risks at home, school and on line
- We will teach you how to get help if you are worried or unhappy

What to do if you have a worry

If you have a worry you can talk to any adult in school, bring along a friend if it will help you. All adults in school will listen but some adults have a special job in school to keep you safe. They are Mrs Day, Mrs Tee and Mr Wells:

If you feel you talk to someone and nothing changes or stops you worrying then talk to another adult. If you are worried about another child or if an adult is making you feel unsafe do not keep a secret, talk!




Don't keep it a secret if someone is:

- bullying you
- saying funny things to you that you do not like or upsets you
- touching you in a way that makes you uncomfortable, or gives you a funny feeling in your tummy
- trying to give you tablets, cigarettes, drugs or alcohol
- hitting or hurting you
- not looking after you or caring for you properly

Remember don't keep an online secret either, tell if:

- people are bullying on line
- sending unkind messages about you or others
- doing or saying something that makes you uncomfortable online
